### Part I: Causes

#### The Great Awakening

- A revival of religious spirit that favored emotional connections with God over tradition.
- Led by travelling preachers who challenged people's lack of fervor.
- Encouraged people to challenge church leaders if they were not living up to expectations.
- Eliminated many religious divisions among colonists since they united behind these new ideas instead of their specific church.



- War ends with English getting a bunch more land and agreeing they will not take any more native lands.
- Colonists aren't part of the negotiations and decide they don't have to follow the agreement.

#### Taxes

 1764: Sugar Act – tax on imported sugar to help pay for the just finished war.

• 1765: Stamp Act – first direct tax, covered most paper goods and documents.

• 1767: Townshend Acts – used to (bribe) judges to remain loyal to

 The real problem was "taxation will representation" not just taxes exist

#### Quartering Acts

- A set of laws requiring colonists to provide housing for British soldiers.
- If they didn't build them houses then the soldiers could just live in the colonists' homes.
- The colonists were responsible for feeding them, cleaning for them, etc.
- To make it worse the soldiers were there to keep the colonists under control.

#### Boston Massacre

- A group of angry colonists were harassing some British soldiers.
- The British soldiers fired into the crowd killing four colonists.
- The soldiers claimed self defense.
- The colonists claimed murder.




#### Boston Tea Party

- To protest, the colonists dressed as natives, snuck onto a British ship and threw all the tea into the harbor.






#### Common Sense

• A pamphlet written to persuade commoners to support independence.

- Connected the ideals of the Great Awakening to political ideals of liberty.
- Used simple arguments like:
  - An island should not rule a continent.
  - America is so far from Britain that it would take at least a year to address any problems.

- The British heard of a weapons storehouse in the city of Concord.
- On the march they were spotted which led to Paul Revere's famous ride.
- Minutemen from the area massed and challenged them.
