"We learn about ecosystems, diversity, vertebrates, and invertebrates. Everything you learn in science you can learn here," says Mr. Gibbs.



"The reason we chose to go to the zoo for our field trip is because we are doing an animal unit of study," Mrs. Hillhouse said.






