It was sponsored by the PTA Council and held at the Union Collegiate Academy. The chess tournament was designed to be a fun way for students from different Union schools to interact with each other.

There were 24 contestants from Peters ranging from kindergarten to fifth grade. Contestants played five rounds of chess, each lasting up to 20 minutes. A win was worth one point, a tie was worth half a point, and a loss earned zero points.

First through third graders competed in the morning; fourth and fifth graders played in the afternoon. Kindergartener Isaac Cole entered the morning session and played against first through third graders.

Peters Volunteer of the Month Chris Yeats planned and organized the tournament along with the Union

Awards were given at the end of the tournament ranging from a white ribbon to a gold medal. Two schools won trophies—Cedar Ridge for the most contestants and Jefferson for the highest overall percentage of wins. Peters came in a close second to Jefferson trailing by less than one tenth of a point. "My favorite part of the chess tournament was competing with other schools and winning an award at the end," said fifth grader Bryce Hall.

"I liked going against other students that were challenging," fifth grader Riley Black said.

Mrs. Keller has also been helping Ms. Story by sorting books in her room. Teachers can go into her room and check out books any time of the day.


"I'm very grateful that Mrs. Keller took her own time to help me," expressed Ms. Story.


But guess who has to put up with kids not liking their food? The lunch ladies.

Matilda likes to read, but all her parents care about is watching television!



come back for the next dish. Then, finally, after hearing her mama and daddy chat for what seemed like forever, Ida B finally says, "There is never enough time for fun."




