


this job is coming to Peters every day and the kids she gets to work with.

Jasai Brunson, "It is always so much fun wearing different things. My favorite day is Hat Day!"




Tulsa Drillers mascot Hornsby makes an appearance at the Peters Red Ribbon assembly.

for you. It's about a boy who lived in a cupboard under the stairs with his aunt and uncle, the Dursleys. One day he finds out he's a wizard and goes




to school at Hogwarts. There he finds out what really happened to his parents. If you want to find out too, check out this book at the Peters library.


Book Fair a Success


The ozone is a colorless and odorless gas that is made up of oxygen. Most oxygen in the air is O2. This means that there are two joined oxygen atoms.

The ozone layer helps protect us on Earth from the sun's harmful ultraviolet rays. It is a protective shield that becomes weaker when gases from factories, cars, trucks and gas stations travel to the ozone and destroy ozone molecules.

Nurse Dean said, "The ozone is more harmful to kids because they are lower to the ground where harmful gases are produced." Children with asthma are at the highest risk from exposure to the ozone because they have less develop lungs.

Nurse Dean also points out that the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) has established an air quality index chart that helps to determine safe gas levels for outside activities.

"On high ozone alert days everyone should not mow their yards or fill up their cars with gas. It's a great idea to walk or carpool to work. This saves harmful gases from going into the air," Nurse Dean said.
