In my classroom, a large amount of people still don't capitalize their names, the names of various stores, etc. In this column, I will teach you when to capitalize nouns.

The reason we capitalize certain things like "Wal-Mart" or "Russell Stover" is because those things are proper nouns. If you were to say something like, "the store," it would be a common noun. The place, person or thing that is used as a specific name would be capitalized. Anything else would NOT be capitalized because you would use it commonly. For example, (proper noun) "Can we go to JC Penney's and get some clothes?" That would be an example of a proper noun. Another example would be, (common noun) "I need to go to the store and buy some milk." I replaced the proper noun with a common noun by saying, "the store."

Your name, well, first of all your name should always be capitalized and NEVER not capitalized. Secondly, it looks cooler with the first letter capitalized. Remember, always capitalize your name and proper nouns.



"How Snow Came to Be"


Myth by Alex Bateman, 2nd Grade


