

Say your apologies. Don't wait a month for your friend to apologize. Make the first move.



Book Review by Wyatt Hunt, 5th Grade




when he comes out, she changes. Her father changes her. This is because she feels happy. But her father disobeys the rules he must follow out of prison. Check the book out at the library to see what happens.

WAY too short and now you're grounded because you told your mom it was OK. If you had a uniform it wouldn't matter, would it?


Now I say it wouldn't be bad to try uniforms. Students just need to give them a chance. Broken rules, bullying, and time wasted all could be solved by uniforms.
