Up With Trees is an organization that plants trees in public areas and schools in Broken Arrow. They delivered and donated these trees to Peters.

Eric and Charles, who work for Union operations, helped plant the trees. Eric and Charles also dug the holes for the trees. When GATE planted the trees it was muddy and wet and they also ran out of shovels.

Fourth Grade GATE students used the Up With Trees website to decide which trees to plant. Students read about different types of trees and picked the best ones for the playground.

Fourth grade GATE students discussed what the school should do to keep the trees safe. They had an idea that each class could adopt a tree.



They could name it and water it on their recycling day. To claim a tree, each teacher drew from a hat. Fourth grade GATE then led each class outside to find their tree.

Up With Trees (UWT) started in 1976. They have helped plant over 30,000 trees at more than 500 sites. UWT plants trees along streets, trails, in parks, at schools and other public properties. The UWT mission is to “beautify greater Tulsa by planting trees and to create urban forestry awareness through education.”

Frank Phillips was the owner of Woolaroc. He owned the Phillips Conoco Petroleum Company. He was born near Scotia, New York.

Frank Phillips sponsored a plane called Woolaroc. There was a race from Oakland, California to Honolulu, Hawaii. On August 24-25 1927 the Woolaroc won the race. The plane finished in 26 hours, 17

minutes, and 33 seconds. The plane was retired to Woolaroc. That is the story of how Woolaroc came to be.

Mr. Phillips started to accumulate several artifacts. He constructed a building for those artifacts. Woolaroc houses one of the largest collections of western artifacts. Woolaroc stands for wood, lakes, and rocks. The ranch was built in 1925 which is part of the address.

In the lodge, there are 97 animal heads displayed in one of the rooms. They were not hunted but died of natural causes.

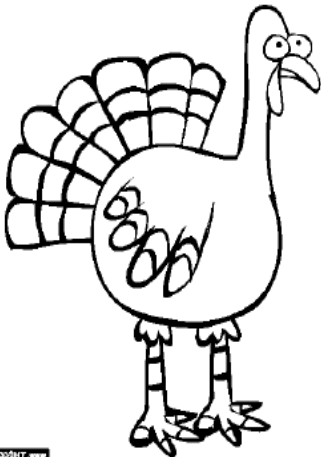
The Union Foundation helps raise money so that teachers across the district can write grants for things they need for the school or their classrooms.

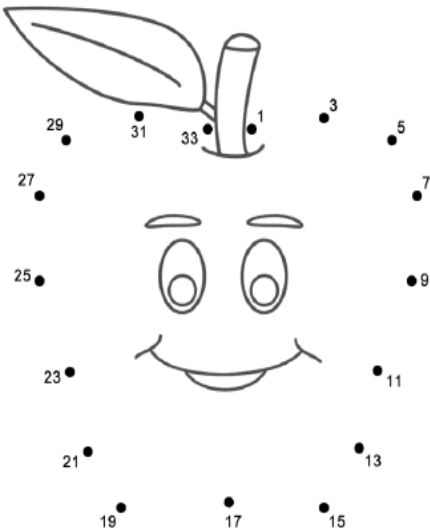

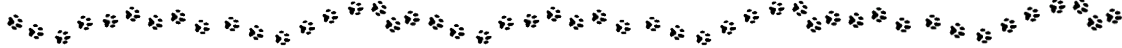

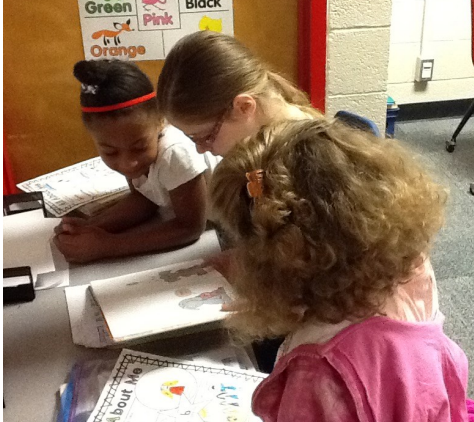
Book Buddies

“My favorite part of Pioneer Day

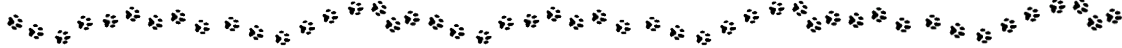
was the picnic because we got an extra long recess. I got to see my sister and her friends,” said Leah Grace Hemm.

This was a great experience that third graders will remember for a long time.



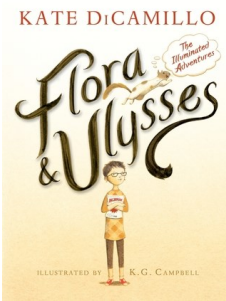
Flora and Ulysses

I don't want to ruin the book but it is one of the best books I have ever read and if you read it, you will love it too.



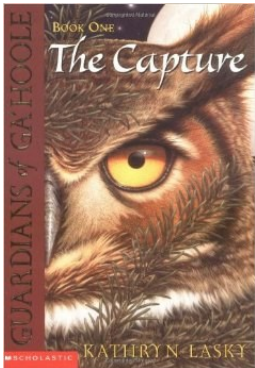
Guardians of Ga'hoole: The Capture

The Best Christmas Pageant Ever

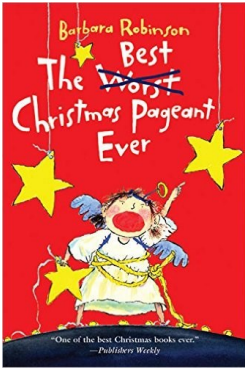

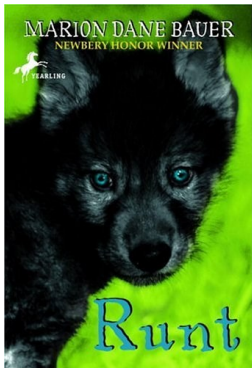
Runt

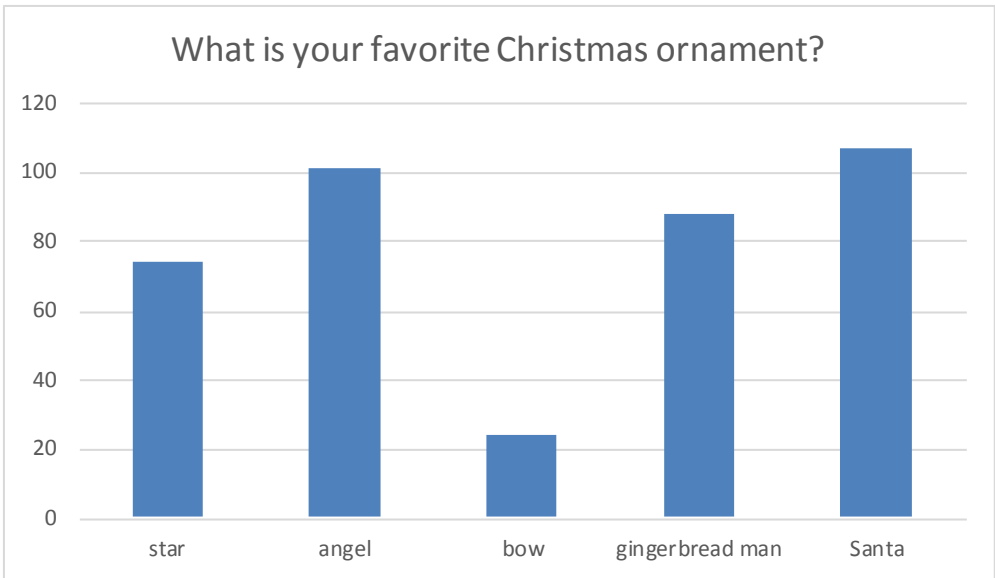

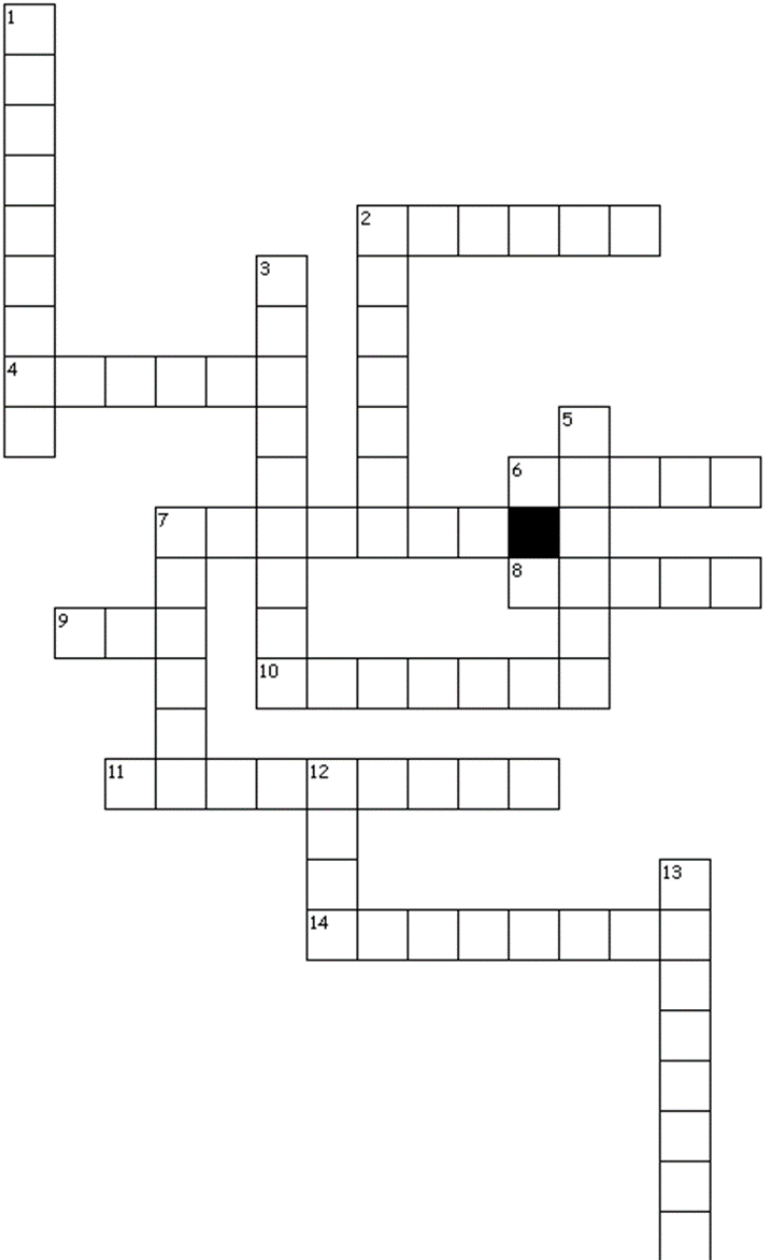

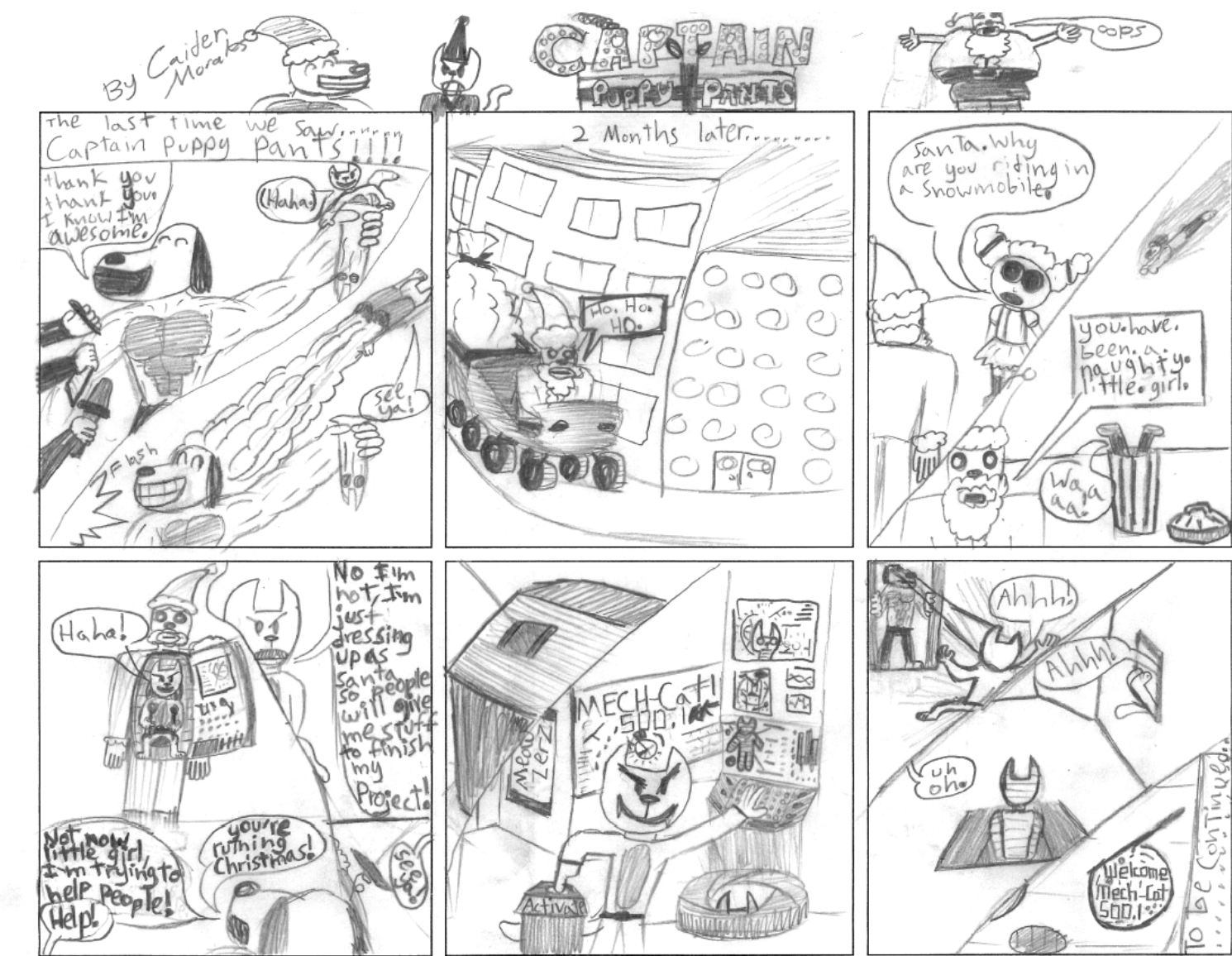
